Getting your results

View your scores online within three days. Go to www.GED123.org. Log in as a returning student using your access code or the e-mail address and password you used to create your online account.

Receive your diploma in one week if you pass. The diploma and an official transcript will be mailed to the address on your GED record. Please give any address corrections to the GED examiner before you leave today if you have moved or are not sure what the address is on your record.

Understanding your scores

To earn a GED diploma in Kentucky you must earn 2250 total points (450 average) with no individual content area score lower than 410. Standard scores on the GED Tests range from 200 to 800. A percentile rank is also given for each content area. The percentile rank compares your scores to those of graduating high school seniors and shows the percentage of those seniors who earned scores at or below those you earned. If you get a score of ** in Writing, that means

your essay did not meet the minimum passing score. You will have to retake both the multiple choice and essay parts of this test again.

What if you don't pass?

You don't have to take the whole test again, just those content areas where you need additional points to pass. You will keep your highest score in any content area, even if you retest and make a lower score.

Go back to the adult education center, get some more instruction and retake the Official GED Practice Tests for any subjects you want to take again. Improved Official GED Practice Test scores are required for any content area you want to take again.

Don't delay, go ahead and earn your GED diploma while you're familiar with the test and subject matter.

Non-passing scores expire

when a new version of the GED Tests is released. A new version is expected to be released soon. GEDTS® will announce the date.
